# Minister's Musings

As we carry on into the New Year, we remember the Christmas season. On Christmas Eve, we celebrate a moment when God's vast love broke into our world through the birth of Christ, changing the course of history and how we understand our place within it, much like a thread weaving through the fabric of time. God's love is not a distant concept but a deeply personal reality tailored to each of us. As our faces warm against the gentle glow of Advent candles, our hearts turn to a profound truth illuminated by the story of God made flesh, of hope coming down and calling us by name. The infinite God who orchestrated the cosmos, who set each star in the sky, is the same God who crafted the uniqueness of each of us—from the swirls of our fingerprints to the dreams nestled deep within our souls.

This poem was written by Rev. Sarah Speed and it felt pertinent to share with you Christmas Eve, and I'll share it again here. She writes,

"My grandmother was strong. That's what they tell me. She played piano and clipped coupons. She raised four kids. One was sick. One never would, never could grow up. But she loved them all. And when life fell apart in brand new ways, she bought books. She went back to school. She started over again. She was the kind of strong that reminds you of a live oak. The kind of woman, the kind of tree, you'd want to crawl up into and whisper, "Tell me how you did it. Tell me how you survived the storm." She was fifty-one when a vessel in her brain burst, blood coloring outside the lines, blood stealing large swathes of her strength with every pulse. After that, she never did play piano, read, or clip coupons. After that, she never could find the words. Nouns became things to point out. Names became numbers. Conversation creaked and slowed, but one word stayed. The name of my baptism never crossed her lips, but when my grandmother saw me, she'd say—Heeeeey Love. My grandmother and God have this in common. Both know my name. Both call me Love."

God was with the shepherds and the Magi then and is with us now. What a marvelous reality—love made a way to be near us when there was no way. In Jesus, love has a name. As candles flicker and carols are sung, hold close to the truth that love knows your name.

Eleven members of the Scudder Circle gathered together for our December luncheon at CJ's Restaurant for a time of food and fellowship. Thanks to the generosity of those present we collected \$150 in offering which was used to support the Angel Tree Gift program of Prison Fellowship.

We remain grateful to the members of St John's for their support of our fund-raising efforts. Our recent sales of jewelry at the Christmas Bazaar brought in \$535.65. Your support of our soup and bread sales earlier this year totaled \$1,196. With your support we have been able to donate a total of \$875 to various Missions of the Month and \$600 to our Deacon's Food Pantry. We also provided \$700 in monetary support to our Missionary families: the Bodes, the Horvats and JJ TenClay. In addition we made donations of \$150 each to Love Beyond Walls,

the Hudson River Housing and Prison Fellowship. We also sponsored collection of NEW underwear for distribution to people of need in Haiti. Members support the Scudder Circle through offerings and donations at our monthly meetings. This year that support totaled \$962. Finally, your usage of the link on St John's website to make purchases of RADA Cutlery brought in \$57.60 in 2024.

Soup sales will begin after worship service on Sunday, January 5th. Bev Kipp has again offered to make bread to be sold with our soups and we are so grateful for her commitment. We know how popular her breads are! If you enjoy making soup and would like to donate some to sell please speak to Mary Bayer about this and she will see that you have containers for the soup.

January MOM Heifer International-Give the Gift of Bees

Missions This month we are supporting the bees! A Heifer honeybee donation includes bees, a hive box and training in beekeeping techniques. Bees work hard for struggling families and are important for the environment. They pollinate forage plants for livestock, flowering plants and food crops. Bees also spread pollen and nectar which can help improve soil microbial activity and nutrient cycling, helping to make soil healthier and more fertile. Bees help seed production by cross pollination.

Along with helping the environment, bees boost income of families through the sales of honey, wax and pollen. Bees help the growth of the family's crops through pollination. Healthy beehives can double the fruit and vegetable yields of small farms. The gift of bees can provide good nutrition, steady and dependable income, increased crop yields, and supply money for school fees and supplies. The families learn a new skill and they are obligated to pass on the gift to others in their community by sharing the bees (and the skills needed) as the bees increase in numbers.

# PROPERTY COMMITTEE – JANUARY 2025 – A BRAND-NEW YEAR

Happy New Year to you, the congregation of this beautiful church, from the Property Committee. We've gone through the season of Advent, celebrated Christmas and are at the beginning of a brand-new year.

The two major tasks that most of you are familiar with and that were mentioned in the December Kerk, are the replacement of the over 35-year-old fuel oil tanks under the sanctuary and the repair of the fire damage in the parsonage. Property and Finance committees have been meeting and preparing to get these two items completed.

After two unavoidable delays, the fuel tanks are scheduled to be replaced on January 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup>. Perhaps by the time you read this issue of the Kerk, the oil company will have already completed this project.

The fire repair and rehabilitation to the parsonage is a multi-step process and must be done in a specific order. We have received funds from the insurance company. The next step is a required asbestos abatement followed by a thorough cleaning of the house. Then the building contractor can come in and do the actual repairs. Please keep these major items in your prayers in the coming weeks and months.

The parking lot has only needed to be plowed once and the volunteer shovelers have had an easy time of it so far. Surely there will be more snow in the near future. Member of this committee are always willing to pitch in to do other tasks as they pop up. We meet the second Tuesday of the month at 7:00. if you would like to join us, just pop in at a meeting and surprise us!

#### Draft Consistory Minutes – December 19, 2024

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 by Pastor Alisha. She opened the meeting with prayer and provided a devotion based on an Advent poem.

# Motion made, seconded, and carried (M/S/C) to approve the minutes and meeting agenda.

**Pastoral Report:** Pastor Alisha reviewed all meetings, administrative tasks, and ministry being undertaken during this past month. **Motion M/S/C to approve Pastoral Report.** 

**Financial Review**: Glenn Countryman reviewed the November Narrative that explains the month's income and expenses. He also asked if there were questions on the Profit and Loss Report. No one had any questions. **Motion M/S/C to approve Financial Review.** 

#### Committee Reports:

Pastor Alisha asked if consistory members had any questions or concerns about committee reports. Committee members highlighted a few items in their reports. See reports for additional information.

#### Faith and Education:

Desiree reported that this Sunday the children will be role-playing the Nativity.

#### Fellowship:

Elizabeth thanked everyone who helped with refreshments for Fred Bier's funeral. January's Turkey Dinner is cancelled due to family illness.

#### Finance:

Glenn stated that there are four finance recommendations. Explanations of the recommendations will be provided during special reports/recommendations in the meeting.

**Mission and Outreach:** Laurie reported that the Christmas presents are being handed out to the food pantry families. The deacons were grateful that M & O Committee members were available to help distribute gifts. January's MOM is the Heifer International-Honeybees project. More information will be in the next Kerk and in the weekly bulletins.

**Property:** Glenn reported that the delivery of new oil tanks and the removal of the old oil tanks was postponed. New dates are January 7 & 8. Denis Doyle and Glenn have been working with Guide One, our insurance company, to proceed with the steps to prepare to repair and clean the parsonage following the Oct. 27 fire. It's a slow process and we need to follow the insurance company's guidelines. He mentioned that the finance committee has recommended opening a new checking account for the coverage settlement regarding the parsonage. This would be a separate checking account only for parsonage expenses and incomes. Glenn is in search of additional members to join the property committee.

**Worship**: Terry mentioned that she has been organizing the Christmas Eve Service by obtaining volunteers to usher, gathering candles, and helping with setting up the poinsettias. A pianist is being hired for Christmas Eve Service since Roy Feldhusen will be singing in the choir in place of Joey Breslau. The choir will be singing 2 anthems and a song during the offertory. Zoe Auerbach and others will be playing string instruments during services once a month as a way to give back to the church for the usage of the church building for her recitals.

**Technology:** Pete reported that there is a major need for people to learn how to use the technology involved during streaming of the services. There has been one volunteer so far, which the technology team is grateful for. This past Wednesday, there were software issues that prevented the cameras to work correctly, therefore, only audio could be recorded for the funeral.

#### Motion made, seconded, and carried to approve all committee reports.

#### Working Recommendations and Special Reports:

FCR#1: When the Nancy Finkel bequest is received the bequest be placed in a short-term CD until such time as the Finance and Investment policies are approved. Once the policies are approved the final disposition of the bequest will be decided by the consistory. **Motion M/S/C to approve FCR#1.** 

FCR#2: Increase the Endowment fund withdrawal to \$13,750 from the current \$10,000 for 2024. This is the maximum amount allowed and will provide \$9,400 towards the \$11,292 for the oil tank replacement.

#### Motion M/S/C to approve FCR#2.

FCR#3: A representative from Finance Committee, designated by Finance, is to be represented at each Consistory Meeting. The representative will present the Finance narrative and answer any finance related questions. If the answer is not immediately known, the representative will follow up and provide a response to Consistory via e-mail. **Motion M/S/C to approve FCR#3.** 

FCR#4: A new checking account at Rhinebeck Bank be opened for the purpose of depositing settlements from Guide One Insurance Company for the purposes of repairing the parsonage including the \$289,976.52 and any additional funds received. Signers of the account to be George Michael (Hop), Glenn Countryman, and Denis Doyle. **Motion M/S/C to approve FCR#4.** 

## Motion M/S/C to approve adjourning the meeting after prayer.

Glenn closed the meeting in prayer.

Meeting adjourned at 8:45 p.m.

The next regular meeting of consistory is January 16, 2024.

# Finance Narrative to Consistory for November 2024:

The above November numbers include a stock donation made in November with the check received in early December and M&O checks for the months of August through October, paid in early December. This is the best number we have for the year-to-date deficit.

We have been notified that the church is to receive \$5,808.54 from Nancy Finkel's estate. See motion 1.

A meeting was held with Emily Halstein about accounting changes. The accounting changes will not be completed until at least June 2025. Changes will start in January. The items we label as liabilities will be moved into a new checking or savings account. The Emmaus Road checking account will be closed and the money to be moved into this new "liability" account along with the other items now labeled liabilities. A new line item in this account will be added for the Fellowship money.

The church will pay the utility bills for the house Alsiha is in. We will submit proof of bill and payment to insurance company who will reimburse the church for the expense while Alsiha is displaced from the Parsonage.

A check for \$289,976.52 is coming from Guide One Insurance as a settlement of fire coverage. Cost of estimate is \$98,882.47 for mitigation, repair is \$234,822.58, loss recoverable depreciation of (hold back) of \$41,228.53 and \$2,500 deductible on the policy.

## **Did You Know?**

The St. John's congregational family is a collection of people "doing the good that's theirs to do".

Any day of the week, any number of vehicles can be seen in the St. John's parking lot. It's expected on a Sunday morning with the usual busyness:

- Choir members practicing early with the music director/musicians to enhance the morning service.
- Two people welcoming and greeting arrivals.
- The Worship team preparing the sanctuary for the morning service as well as for Communion as scheduled.
- The liturgy reader ready to be an important part of the service.
- The audio-visual equipment will be staffed to provide improved sound for sanctuary

worshipers and YouTube opportunities for those at home.

- Sunday School instructors and nursery helpers will be ready to welcome our young ones.
- Mission and Outreach committee members will meet to research and direct our missions' initiative.
- The Fellowship Hour will be faithfully staffed by the Fellowship team.

## But what's going on the other days?

- Volunteers mow & weed-whack the cemetery/church grounds, or in winter, remove snow as needed on walks, steps and driveways.
- Church & parsonage foundation plantings are weeded, edged & pruned by volunteers with gardening skills & interest.
- The food pantry personnel serve the constant stream of clients.
- There is a team of counters processing & depositing the weekly offerings.
- The AV volunteers regularly up-grade and maintain the equipment.
- John & Karen Roberts lead Bible Study on Wednesday mornings.
- Scudder and Arts & Crafts members work to support a variety of programs/missions.
- The Property Committee members deal with building repairs, painting, tree maintenance, monument restorations, stone wall repairs and pest control, just to name a few.
- There are likely other volunteer efforts that have been inadvertently omitted.

Quite simply, the vehicles belong to St. John's Church family members, giving their time and talents to support and maintain the facilities, ministries and missions of their church. Clearly the most important asset of St. John's is the Congregation.

**Thank you** for your 2024 gifts of all types. Collectively it represents the efforts of this Congregation to carry out God's Mission. Merry Christmas.
